STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

Selection of manuscripts for publication is based on a blind peer review process (the identity of the authors not known to the reviewers). Reviewers evaluate manuscripts for the importance of the work, including adequacy of the rationale for the study or paper, scope and adequacy of the literature review, soundness of the methods, educational implications, and quality of writing.
