#### STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

*Exceptional Children*, an official journal of the Council for Exceptional Children, publishes original research and analyses that focus on the education and development of exceptional infants, toddlers, children, youth, and adults. This includes descriptions of research, research reviews, methodological reviews of literature, data-based position papers, and policy analyses. *Exceptional Children* publishes quantitative, qualitative, and single-subject design studies. The journal also includes reports of official actions of the governing bodies of CEC.

Selection of manuscripts for the publication is based on a blind peer review process (the identity of the authors not known to the reviewers). Reviewers evaluate manuscripts for the importance of the work, including adequacy of the rationale for the study or paper, scope and adequacy of the literature review, soundness of the methods, educational implications, and quality of writing. Author guidelines are available from the Editor or from CEC headquarters.

Four copies of all manuscripts as well as an electronic copy on a 3½" disk or CD (Microsoft Word or RTF file) should be submitted to Steve Graham, Editor, *Exceptional Children*, Vanderbilt University, P.O. Box 228, Department of Special Education, Nashville, TN 37203. Authors should include a cover letter indicating that the manuscript has not been previously published and is not currently under consideration elsewhere. The cover letter must also indicate if data from the manuscript is part of a larger study or if any part of the data has been included in another paper.
